- 1. What themes are presented in the film?
- 2. 'Scrooged' is based on Charles Dicken's 'A Christmas Carol', how does the film differ from the original story?
- 3. What morals are being taught in the film? Or, rather, what is the most important moral the film displays?
- 4. Does the film provide a satisfying notion of Christmas cheer? The critic Roger Ebert criticizes Murray's interpretation of the story:
