- 1. What are the driving themes in the film? You might want to consider the themes of love and obsession. How are these themes presented throughout the film?
- 2. At what point in the film does Scottie change from being a detective to being obsessed with Madeline?
- 3. What do you make of the films portrayal of women? Both Madeline and Judy are moulded by the men they are with (Gavin and then Scottie).
- 4. Which character do you sympathise with? Scottie who in the end loses both women, or Madeleine/Judy who is presented as an object to the very end?
